1.1 pigeon (n)

περιστέρι

a small bird with grey and white feathers, often found in cities

An old woman was throwing pieces of bread for the **pigeons** that had flown down into the square.

1.2 tolerate (v)

ανέχομαι

to be able to experience or be in contact with something (e.g. a toxin) and not be damaged The workers' ears are unable to **tolerate** the dangerously loud noises, and they therefore have to wear protective equipment.

• tolerance (n), tolerable (adj), intolerable (adj)

1.3 counterconditioning (n)

αντισυσσωμάτωση, έκθεση ασθενούς στο αντικείμενο της φοβίας του με σκοπό τη θεραπεία του

(in animal training and the treatment of some conditions, e.g. phobias) the technique of teaching the subject to react positively to something that used to cause a negative reaction

In order to help the patient overcome his fear of crowds, the doctor used a **counterconditioning** technique, taking the patient to several busy locations and rewarding him each time he managed to remain calm.

• countercondition (v)

1.4 arachnophobia (n)

αραχνοφοβία

a pathological fear of spiders

Arachnophobia sufferers experience a pathological fear at the sight of spiders.

• arachnophobe (n), arachnophobic (adj)

1.5 cvnophobia (n)

κυνοφοβία

a pathological fear of dogs

Her pathological **cynophobia** meant that she could not even come close to a dog without going into a panic.

cynophobe (n), cynophobic (adj)

1.6 evolutionary (adj)

εξελικτικός

relating to the process by which different species now living have developed from earlier biological forms over billions of years 'Survival of the fittest' is an **evolutionary** mechanism in which the reproductive success of those creatures that are best suited to their environment leads to the development of the species overall.

• evolution (n), evolve (v), (highly) evolved (adj)

1.7 acquire (v)

αποκτώ

to develop a physical or mental characteristic By going to the gym regularly, she had acquired strong muscles in her legs.

acquisition (n), acquired (adj)

1.8 intrique (v)

προκαλώ το ενδιαφέρον

to fascinate someone and make him/her curious

The strange title of the book **intrigued** me and made me curious enough to pick it off the shelf.

• intriguing (adj)

1.9 engage someone (in something) (v) εμπλέκω κάποιον σε μια δραστηριότητα ή σε

εμπλέκω κάποιον σε μια δραστηριότητα ή σε μια συζήτηση

to actively involve someone in an activity (e.g. a conversation)

We tried to **engage** Paul in our discussion, but it seemed he didn't want to join in a conversation about sports.

engaged (adj), engagement (n)

1.10 associate something with something (v)

συσχετίζω/συνδέω δυο πράγματα μεταξύ τους

to connect something with something else in your mind

That song always brings back memories of my trip to Spain, and I always **associate** the words **with** the people I met back then.

 association (between something and something) (n), associative (adj)

1.11 stimulus (n) (pl. stimuli)

ερέθισμα/κίνητρο

something (e.g. a sound) that makes a living organism react in a certain way In order to relax, the dogs need a quiet environment, away from the many **stimuli** (e.g. street noises) that make them excited.

• stimulate (v), stimulated (adj)

1.12 crippling (adj)

παραλυτικός (φόβος)

(e.g. of fear) causing someone to be unable to do something

Although she seems confident and relaxed when talking to an audience, she often experiences **crippling** anxiety before going on stage, and the fear is so terrible that she thinks she might not be able to do it.

• cripple (v)

1.13 accustom someone (to something / to doing something) (v)

αποκτώ τη συνήθεια να κάνω κάτι

to make someone become used to something and consider it normal

Although his usual habit was to get up at 8 am, he gradually **accustomed** himself **to rising** at 6 am, by setting his alarm for that time every day for two months.

• custom (n), customary (adj)

1.14 subconsciously (adv) υποσυνείδητα

in a way that is affected or caused by the hidden part of the mind that the person concerned is unaware of Psychologists are researching how people may subconsciously react to certain words in a negative way, without their even being actively aware of it.

• subconscious (the) (n), subconscious (adj)

1.15 sequence (n) [2]

αλληλουχία (γεγονότων ή αντικειμένων)

a group of related things that follow each other in a specific order

To make the computer program work, you need to follow this exact **sequence** of steps and enter each command in the specific order.

• sequence (v), sequential (adj)

1.16 stem from something (phr v)

προέρχεται από κάτι

to be the result of something

Our feelings can often **stem from**meteorological conditions, as the weather can

cause us to feel different emotions.

1.17 bark (v)

γαβγίζω

(e.g. of a dog) to make a loud vocal sound The dog kept **barking** for hours and was only quiet again when the owners returned home.

bark (n)

1.18 growl (v)

γρυλίζω

(e.g. of a dog) to make a low vocal sound in the throat, e.g. as a sign of aggression The way the dog was growling, it sounded like she was about to bite me.

• growl (n)

1.19 responsive (to something) (adj) ανταποκρινόμενος σε κάτι (π.χ. σε μια θεραπεία)

(of a patient, symptom or medical condition) affected by a form of medical treatment The pain was not **responsive to** the usual synthetic medications and only seemed to be lessened by natural plant-based drugs.

• responsiveness (n), respond (to something) (v)

1.20 indicate (v)

καταδεικνύω

to show something

The results of this experiment **indicate** that the drugs are safe, a fact that is also shown by other experiments conducted elsewhere.

• indication (n), indicative (of something) (adj)

1.21 procrastinate (v)

χρονοτριβώ

to delay doing something (e.g. a piece of work), usually by doing other, less important things instead

Instead of starting work on the assignment, I spent all morning **procrastinating** by needlessly cleaning the apartment.

• procrastination (n)

1.22 highlight (v)

τονίζω κάτι/δίνω έμφαση σε κάτι

to draw attention to something

The recent robbery has highlighted the need
for better security and shown, in the most
emphatic way, how costly it can be to cut back
protections.

1.23 chore (n)

δουλειές του σπιτιού, αγγαρείες

a regular task, usually one that is done in the home (e.g. cleaning)

I took out the trash, washed up the dishes, cleaned the bathroom, and took care of numerous other **chores** as well.

1.24 priority: give priority to something (phr) προτεραιότητα/δίνω προτεραιότητα σε κάτι to consider something more important than

to consider something more important than others

The history program **gives priority to** the country's national development, largely ignoring its role in international events.

• prioritize (v), priority (n)

1.25 pressing (adj)

πιεστικό/επείγον

requiring immediate action

Since this matter is **pressing** and cannot wait until tomorrow, we must deal with it now.

1.26 disadvantage: put someone at a disadvantage (phr)

μειονέκτημα/βάζω κάποιον σε μειονεκτική θέση

to make it more difficult for someone or something to succeed

Most of the other candidates for this job speak several languages each, so speaking only one puts you at a disadvantage.

1.27 hand: at hand (phr)

αυτό με το οποίο ασχολούμαστε τώρα π.χ. μια δραστηριότητα

requiring attention at the present time Instead of discussing the matter **at hand**, he spoke about subjects that were completely unrelated to what we had to do now.

1.28 excessive (adj)

υπερβολικός

more than necessary or normal

It is enough to lift weights at the gym three or
four times a week; every day is excessive.

• excess (n), exceed (v)

1.29 last-minute (adj)

τελευταίας στιγμής

done at the latest possible time before something happens

The article will go online in twenty minutes, but we can still do a **last-minute** check for grammar mistakes.

1.30 mental (adj)

νοητικός

relating to the mind

In my mind, I tried to form a **mental** image of what the temple must have looked like 4,000 years ago.

1.31 stimulation (n)

διέγερση

the action of making someone interested, enthusiastic or excited While some TV programs do provide stimulation for children's minds, others do not push the audience to use their intelligence at

stimulate (v), stimulating (adj)

1.32 adrenalin (n)

all.

αδρεναλίνη

a hormone that is released in the body in response to fear, causing an increase in heart rate, breathing, mental alertness and muscle power

Some people love dangerous sports that get the **adrenalin** pumping through their blood, but others prefer safer and more relaxing pastimes.

1.33 rush (n) [2]

ξαφνικό έντονο συναίσθημα

a sudden and strong feeling When Elvis, the King of Rock n' Roll, came out on to the stage, the **rush** of excitement that shot through the audience caused an explosion of shouting, cheering, whistling, clapping.

1.34 straightforward (adj)

ξεκάθαρος/σαφής

uncomplicated

Anyone can understand and follow these **straightforward** instructions.

1.35 neurological (adj)

νευρολογικό

related to the nervous system

These chemicals can cause neurological changes in the human brain.

• neurologist (n)

1.36 root (n)

η ρίζα (π.χ. ενός προβλήματος)

the main cause or origin of something Educators once thought that this learning difficulty may have a genetic cause, but it now seems that the **root** of the problem may be early childhood experiences.

1.37 bring myself to do something (v)

πείθω τον εαυτό μου να κάνει κάτι (συνήθως δυσάρεστο ή δύσκολο)

to force myself to do something that I do not want to do, e.g. because it is unpleasant I know these toys are old and useless, but they're so special to me that I can't bring myself to throw them out.

1.38 urgent (adj)

επείγον

requiring immediate action or response

Michael received an **urgent** phone call during
our meeting and had to leave the office
immediately.

• urgency (n)

1.39 put something off (phr v)

αναβάλλω κάτι

to delay doing something Seeing as we've already done a lot of work today, let's **put** this task **off** until tomorrow.

1.40 get (a)round to something / doing something (phr v)

καταφέρνω τελικά να κάνω κάτι

to find enough time to do something I know you already have a busy schedule, but please try and **get around to replying** to that email, as it's been sitting in your inbox for two weeks.

1.41 submit (v)

υποβάλλω (π.χ. μια εργασία)

to give something (e.g. a school assignment) to someone in authority (e.g. a teacher) so that it can be assessed

Students receive lower marks for work that is handed in late, so make sure you **submit** your assignments to your tutor on or before the final date.

• submission (n)

1.42 distinct (adj)

ξεχωριστό/εμφανές

easy to notice

Anyone can see the **distinct** similarity between these two album covers.

• distinctness (n), distinguish (v)

1.43 pattern (n)

μοτίβο/επαναλαμβανόμενο σχέδιο

a regular and repeating form in the way that something occurs or is done

The statistics showed that customer numbers were at their lowest at the beginning of each month and reached their highest at each month's end, and this pattern **repeated** throughout the year.

1.44 ample (adj)

άφθονος (π.χ. χρόνος για μια ενέργεια), ικανοποιητικός

more than enough

My ample bank savings were enough to last me through college and allow me to travel as well.

1.45 spare: to spare (phr)

κάτι που περισσεύει και μπορώ να διαθέσω (π.χ. χρόνο ή χρήματα)

extra

We got to the station early, with over an hour to spare before the train was due to leave.

1.46 bring something home to someone (phr v) κάνω κάποιον να συνειδητοποιήσει την σημασία ενός θέματος

to make someone suddenly realize something (e.g. the extent of a problem)

I already had an idea of how bad the problem was, but what really **brought it home to me** was seeing that shocking documentary.

1.47 divided: be divided (over something) (v) διαφοροποιούμαι, διαφωνώ

in disagreement

Soccer fans **are** still **divided over** who has had the greatest playing career: some say Lionel Messi, others Cristiano Ronaldo.

division (n), divisive (adj)

1.48 prioritize (v)

βάζω σε προτεραιότητα

to decide the order in which a number of things (e.g. work tasks) should be completed, according to the importance of each A good way to **prioritize** is to make a list of things you need to do, with the most important at the top and the least important lower down.

• priority (n)

1.49 take on (phr v) [1]

αναλαμβάνω να κάνω κάτι

to agree to do something (e.g. a work task) or be responsible for something, especially something difficult

I'm happy to **take on** more work, as long as I get paid extra for doing it.

1.50 tackle (v)

χειρίζομαι ένα θέμα

to make efforts to deal with a problem More and more students are cheating in exams, and there seems to be no easy way to **tackle** the problem and make sure the rules are followed.

1.51 arise (v)

συμβαίνει, προκύπτει

(of a situation, a problem, etc.) to happen We can always predict what might happen ten years from now, but unexpected situations can still arise at any time.

1.52 reflect (on something) (v)

σκέφτομαι κάτι προσεκτικά

to think carefully about something, usually for a long time

He spent a long time quietly **reflecting on** the question before giving his answer.

• reflection (n), reflective (adj)

1.53 straight away (adv)

άμεσα/αμέσως τώρα

immediately, without delay

You shouldn't wait before replying to the

message - send an answer straight away.

1.54 favorable (adj)

ευνοϊκός, θετικός

showing that you agree with something or have a positive opinion of it

People have a **favorable** opinion of that school and have nothing but good things to say about it.

• favor (v), favor (n)

1.55 undertake (v)

αναλαμβάνω

to take responsibility for doing and completing something (e.g. a work project)

In 1987, they **undertook** a research project that would require the following twenty years to complete.

• undertaking (n)

1.56 outset: from the outset (phr)

από το ξεκίνημα, από την πρώτη μέρα

from the very beginning

In the beginning, many people doubted Jake's ability to do the job, but I had complete confidence in him from the outset.

1.57 subside (v)

καταλαγιάζω, εξασθενώ

to lessen in intensity, violence or severity

On the third day, the storm reached its worst

point, after which it slowly began to **subside**,

gradually giving way to calmer weather.

1.58 go about something / doing something (phr v) καταπιάνομαι με κάτι, διεκπεραιώνω

to begin an activity so that it can be completed Young people usually know how to use the internet, but few elderly people have any idea how to **go about** tasks such as filling in an online form.

1.59 frame: frame of mind

μια συγκεκριμένη διάθεση

a certain kind of feeling (e.g. happiness) that affects your thoughts and behavior I was feeling angry, so I put on some music to put me in a more positive **frame of mind**.

1.60 end up doing something (phr v)

καταλήγω να κάνω κάτι

to eventually come to a situation in which you have to do something

Bill and I were supposed to work together on

the project but he fell ill, so I **ended up doing** most of the work myself.

1.61 set about something / doing something (phr v)

ξεκινώ να κάνω κάτι, αρχίζω να

to start doing something in an energetic and determined way

As soon as I answered the phone, she immediately **set about shouting** at me, without even saying hello first.

1.62 embark (on something) (v)

ξεκινώ κάτι

to begin doing something, usually something important (e.g. a project)

My journey through Italy was to begin the following day, and I felt excited to be embarking on a new adventure.

initial (adj) 1.63

αρχικός

existing or happening at the beginning The designers usually make several changes to the initial drawings, so that the final product eventually looks a lot different.

contrast: by contrast (conj) 1.64 σε αντίθεση

conversely

His early paintings are characterized by a strict realism. The later paintings, by contrast, consist of strange images from his imagination, which look like nothing in the real world.

1.65 backburner: leave something on the backburner (phr)

αναβάλλω κάτι προσωρινά

to delay thinking about or dealing with something until a later time We cannot continue this project until we receive Professor Hitchens' email, so let's leave it on the backburner for now.

1.66 attend to something (v)

παρακολουθώ/προσέχω μια δραστηριότητα

to deal with something (e.g. a task) Michelle had to leave the meeting early, as she had some urgent matters to attend to.

• attention (n)

1.67 preliminary (adj)

προκαταρκτικός, πρόχειρος

happening or existing at an earlier stage, in order to prepare for something This is just a **preliminary** version of the script; the final version will be ready next week.

1.68 aid something / in doing something (v) βοηθάω, ενισχύω

to encourage something Some people find it difficult to concentrate when music is playing, while others find that music aids their concentration.

thrive (on something) (phr v)

αποδίδω τα μέγιστα όταν ασχολούμαι με κάτι, διαπρέπω

to achieve the best results when placed in a certain situation or in certain circumstances Some students are able to work best individually, while others thrive on group work.

1.70 looming (adj)

που επίκειται να συμβεί (μάλλον απειλητικά), καραδοκεί

(of an event) about to happen in the near future and causing worry and anxiety Although the economy was growing, experts warned of a looming economic crisis that was about to hit.

• loom (v)

1.71 boost (v)

τονώνω (π.χ. την παραγωγικότητα)

to help something to increase or improve When I'm feeling tired, I find that all it takes to boost my energy is a cup of strong coffee.

boost (n)

1.72 productivity (n)

παραγωγικότητα

the ability to achieve a large amount of something (e.g. work)

Better organization will allow you to raise your productivity and get more work done.

productive (adj)

1.73 get down to something (phr v)

καταπιάνομαι με κάτι

to begin doing or thinking about something seriously

We should stop wasting time and get down to work.

1.74 self-esteem (n)

αυτοεκτίμηση

self-respect and confidence

By making encouraging comments, teachers can help less confident students by building their **self-esteem** and making them feel proud of themselves and their abilities.

1.75 tendency (n)

τάση

a habit of displaying a particular characteristic or behaving in a certain way

We were surprised to see Simon arrive on time, as he usually has a **tendency** to be late.

• tend to do something (v)

1.76 amygdala (n)

μέρος του εγκεφάλου, αμυγδαλή

an almond-shaped part on each side of the brain, which affects the emotions

The release of adrenalin is controlled by a part of the brain called the **amygdala**.

1.77 vicious circle (n)

φαύλος κύκλος

a situation in which two or more things (e.g. actions) cause each other to become worse, causing the situation to grow increasingly bad The longer you spend using social media, the more you become addicted - it's a vicious circle!

1.78 inadequacy (n)

ανεπάρκεια

an inability to cope with situations or with life in general

Carl feared that he would never be able to form meaningful friendships, and these feelings of **inadequacy** became worse every time he tried and failed to make new friends.

• inadequate (adj)

1.79 run out (phr v)

τελειώνει (σε ποσότητα ή σε χρόνο)

(of an amount of something that you can use) to be used up completely

I really enjoyed playing on the old video games machine, so when my time **ran out** and the game ended I decided to put in another coin and play again.

1.80 strike (v)

χτυπώ (απροσδόκητα, ατυχία ή καταστροφή)

(of a something bad, e.g. a disaster, a disease, etc.) to happen suddenly and cause harm or damage

The storm **struck** at 4 a.m. and, over the following ten hours, caused massive destruction.

1.81 handy (adj)

πρακτικό/εύχρηστο

useful

This smartphone battery charger can fit into any kind of wall socket in the EU, making it handy for traveling.

1.82 barrier (to something) (n)

εμπόδιο

something that prevents something (e.g. communication or progress) that you want or need to achieve

Not having a university degree can be a **barrier to** following a successful career.

1.83 launch myself into something (v)

ξεκινώ να κάνω κάτι

to begin something with energy and enthusiasm An enthusiastic language learner, she **launched herself into** the study of German and had already learned to speak fluently by the end of the month.

1.84 successive (adj)

διαδοχικός

following one another in order

Most students have to go through each

successive high school year, but Martin went
immediately from the first to the fourth year,
because of his excellent academic record.

succession (n), succeed (v)

1.85 sustain (v)

διατηρώ

to make sure that something continues for a long enough period, without stopping There is enough action in the movie to **sustain** viewers' interest for the whole two hours.

sustained (adj)

1.86 motivation (n) [2]

παροχή κινήτρων

the desire or willingness to do something

The team seem to have given up and lost all

motivation to win.

motivated (adj), motivate (v)

1.87 time out (n)

χρόνος διακοπής από εργασία

a time for rest, when you are free from work or study obligations

Having worked hard all month, I took some **time out** to go and visit some friends.

1.88 down-to-earth (adj)

προσγειωμένος

practical and realistic

Instead of discussing complex philosophical concepts, this book offers readers simple, down-to-earth advice about how to live better lives.

1.89 check: keep something in check (phr) έχω κάτι υπό έλεγχο

to keep something under control, especially something that could be damaging if left uncontrolled

By concentrating on your breathing, you can **keep** your anxiety **in check** and prevent your nerves from taking over completely.

1.90 first-hand (adj)

από πρώτο χέρι (π.χ. εμπειρία)

coming from direct personal experience Having been a nurse for ten years, I know from first-hand experience what it's like to work in a hospital.

1.91 overcome (v)

ξεπερνάω

to manage to deal with a problem successfully Thanks to this treatment, many people manage to finally **overcome** their addiction to cigarettes and stop smoking completely.

επέκταση

the action of growing larger

During the next decade, the **expansion** of the

European Union saw the addition of five new

member states.

expand (v), expansive (adj)

1.93 disloyal (to someone/something) (adj)

όχι πιστός σε κάποιον ή σε κάτι

failing to show proper support for someone (e.g. a friend) or something (e.g. a country)

I can't believe you could be so disloyal to
a friend as to reveal her secrets despite her
asking you not to.

• disloyalty (n)

1.94 disapprove (of something) (v)

αποδοκιμάζω

to have or express a negative opinion of someone or something

My parents **disapprove of** tattoos, and they weren't at all happy when I went ahead and got some myself.

• disapproval (n), disapproving (adj)

1.95 dispute (v)

αμφισβητώ (ένα επιχείρημα ή έναν ισχυρισμό)

to question whether something (e.g. a statement made by someone else) is true or accurate

Many **dispute** the findings of the report, claiming that these conclusions were based on insufficient evidence.

• dispute (n), disputable (adj), indisputable (adj)

1.96 liable: be liable to do something (adj)

είναι πιθανό να συμβεί

to be likely to do something, often something

The machine is badly designed and **liable** to malfunction at any moment.

liability (n)

1.97 miss out (on something) (phr v)

χάνω την εμπειρία από κάτι (π.χ. ενός γεγονότος ή μιας κατάστασης)

to be unable to experience or take advantage of an opportunity

I didn't get to see the band perform live when they visited five years ago, so I definitely don't want to **miss out** again when they visit this time.

1.98 redress (v)

επανορθώνω/αποκαθιστώ

to find a solution to a problematic situation

The school directors have been informed of the problem and they have promised to **redress** the issue as soon as possible.

• redress (n)

1.99 declining (adj)

φθίνουσα/σε παρακμή

decreasing

Faced with rapidly **declining** ticket sales, many sports venues are concerned that they may soon have to close down.

• decline (n), decline (v)

1.100 incubator (n)

εκκολαπτήριο (μεταφορικά: ένα περιβάλλον που επιτρέπει σε κάποιον την ανάπτυξη των ικανοτήτων του)

a place or environment that encourages the development of certain characteristics in people, like an actual incubator, i.e. a machine that is used to hatch eggs or grow microorganisms in a laboratory

The university is seen as an **incubator** for future political talent, as several of its graduates went on to hold important government posts.

• incubate (v)

1.101 demanding (adj)

απαιτητικό

requiring a lot of effort or skill Swimming gave him relief from the stress from his **demanding** job.

demand (n), demand (v)

1.102 pursue (v)

ακολουθώ (μια καριέρα)

to be involved in an activity (e.g. a career) over a long period of time

Martha studied law at university but after graduation she decided to **pursue** a career in fashion design.

• pursuit (n)

1.103 serve: serve a purpose (phr)

εξυπηρετώ έναν σκοπό

to be useful in achieving something In a world where almost all information is available online, do traditional, printed encyclopedias still **serve a purpose**?

προσαρμόζομαι στις ανάγκες των εποχών/ καιρών

to modernize

In an effort to **move with the times**, the company stopped producing printed encyclopedias and made their products available online instead.

of small size or extent

It used to be a large international company with a staff of hundreds, but now it is only a **small-scale** local business that employs just ten people.

1.106 prestigious (adj)

με κύρος

high-status

Oxford and Cambridge are two of the most **prestigious** universities in the world, admired for their long history of academic excellence.

1.107 dominance (n)

κυριαρχία

power and influence

Under Napoleon, the French army had complete power over the island and its people, its **dominance** remaining unchallenged for decades.

dominate (v), dominant (adj)

1.108 trend (n)

τάση/κάτι που γίνεται μόδα

a general way that something is changing or developing

Arts education used to be considered highly important in all schools, but the current **trend** in education seems to be towards a greater emphasis on science subjects.

1.109 draft (v)

παίρνω έναν καλαθοσφαιριστή σε μια ομάδα μπάσκετ

to select a player for a sports team

First **drafted** at the age of 18 by the Milwaukee

Bucks, he soon went on to become one of the

greatest players in the NBA.

• the draft (n)

1.110 enroll (on/in something) (v)

εγγράφω

to officially register

You cannot use the university library unless you have **enrolled** on one of the courses.

1.111 hence (conj)

ως εκ τούτου

thus

The Forest Hotel is located on the edge of a large forest, hence the name.

1.112 counterpart (n)

ο αντίστοιχος

We cannot **commence** the discussion until everyone has arrived.

1.252 schedule: ahead of schedule (phr)

before the planned time for completion

The project was finished two weeks ahead of

schedule, so we had time to check everything

before the final date for completion.

1.253 budget: below budget (phr)

χαμηλότερα από τον προβλεπόμενο προϋπολογισμό

spending less money than was originally planned

By using cheaper public transportation instead of our own vehicle, we managed to complete the trip well **below budget**.

1.254 infrastructure (n)

the built structures (e.g. roads, bridges, etc.) that a society needs

The new government will pay for the building of new roads as well as other much-needed infrastructure.

1.255 hot-spot (n)

δημοφιλές σημείο, σημείο αναφοράς

a popular place for entertainment or tourism This nightclub is one of the most popular **hotspots** in town, visited by hundreds of people.

large in size, amount, importance, etc.

We increased our efforts and managed to complete a **considerable** amount of work.

1.257 landmark (n)

ορόσημο, τοπόσημο

something (e.g. a building) that has historical value

For over two hundred years, The Statue of Liberty has been one of the most well-known American **landmarks**.

1.258 massive (adj)

τεράστιο

extremely large

This **massive** building is one of the tallest in the world.

1.259 sufficient (to do something) (adj)

επαρκές

enouah

In the good old days, 50,000 dollars used to be **sufficient** to buy a house.

1.260 agriculture (n)

γεωργία

farming

This land is mainly used for **agriculture** and growing various types of food.

to be able to notice someone or something (e.g. a sound) separately from the rest

The instruments were so loud that we couldn't
pick out the singer's voice at all.

at exactly the same time

To start the machine, you have to push both
buttons simultaneously, not one after the
other.

addresses all the separate issues.

διακριτικό

not immediately obvious or visible, in a way that is interesting or attractive

The **subtle** and gentle colors of her make-up contrasted with the highly visible jewelry she wore.

• subtlety (n)

1.321 flashy (adj)

έντονο, εντυπωσιακός

obviously trying to be impressive Later on, they changed their **flashy** clothes and expensive jewelry for a simpler clothing style.

(of a rule) fixed and to be followed in all cases There are no **hard-and-fast** rules about how to be funny, as different people enjoy different kinds of humor.
