on: for a surface

At, in and on are also used in standard expressions like:

at: at home, at work, at school, at the top, at reception,

in: in a taxi, in an elevator, in Main Street, in a row, in a news article, etc.

on: on a bus, on a plane, on a ship, on a motorbike, on the *left / right, etc.*

Rather and prefer can be used when stating a preference and making a choice.

Subject + would + rather + base verb I would rather ('d rather) go to a warm country.

Subject + would + prefer + to-infinitive *I would prefer to go to a warm country.*

EXTENSION, ELABORATION QUESTIONS

In **Part 4** of the speaking test the examiner will say something like:

Now I'm going to ask you some more questions about this topic.

In this stage of the test the examiner will ask you to elaborate on the topic. Some of these questions will ask you to express your views on the topic in more general terms. These questions will be *heard* only, not read.

Question 1: Some people say renting a house is preferable to owning a house. What do you think?
