MISSION STATEMENT OF THE MODERN GREEK LANGUAGE PROGRAM

The mission of the Modern Greek Language Program at the Hellenic American Union Center for Applied Linguistics and Language Studies (CALLS) is to assist non-native speakers of Greek in acquiring the necessary language skills to participate in a plurilingual context. The Program provides instructional excellence in a supportive, learning-conducive environment and a productive link between language testing and teaching.

The Modern Greek Language Program of the Hellenic American Union is committed to providing equal opportunities for all members of its public and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, gender, sexual orientation, age, religion, national origin, physical disability, or veteran status in its student admissions, recruitment, employment, evaluation, and advancement policies.

Our Programs have been accredited for their quality by the **Commission on English Language Program Accreditation (CEA)**, which is recognized by the U.S Secretary of Education.

Our Programs have been registered to **ISO 9001** by **TÜV HELLAS**, an accredited certification body. The ISO 9001 certificate is the internationally recognized standard for the quality assurance and the systematization of processes applied to the management of businesses and institutions.

The **Common European Framework of Reference** (CEFR) categorizes learners into three broad divisions which are sub-divided into six levels:

A1 - A2: Basic user

B1 - B2: Independent User C1 - C2: Proficient User

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Language courses are offered at all levels for adult non-native speakers of Greek. During the academic year, core courses are offered as follows:

Two academic semesters, each 15 weeks in duration.

Fall semester: from October to February **Spring semester:** From February to June

COURSE BOOKS

Students must purchase the required course books as indicated in the Course Description. The Hellenic American Union does not endorse specific booksellers; students are advised to search for the best prices on the market.

COURSE LEVEL & DESCRIPTION

Modern Greek Language courses cover all levels of language competency (beginners to advanced learners). Courses are offered throughout the year, except in August.

A1 Beginners

This course aims at the A1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type
- introduce themselves and others, ask and answer questions about personal details such as where they are from, where they live, their profession, exchange information about family members, other people they know, things they have
- interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly, clearly, and is prepared to help

A2 Low Intermediate

This course aims at the A2 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, employment)
- communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters
- describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need

B1 Intermediate

This course aims at the B1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in relationships, home country, habits, problems of everyday life, modern way of living, etc
- deal with most situations likely to arise whilst traveling in an area where the language is spoken
- produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest
- describe experiences, events, dreams & ambitions and briefly express opinions, likes and dislikes

B2 Upper Intermediate

This course aims at the B2 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CFFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in their field of specialization
- interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party
- produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects
- explain a viewpoint giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options

C1 Advanced

This course aims at the C1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognize implicit meaning
- express themselves fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions
- use language flexibly and effectively for social, academic, and professional purposes
- produce clear, well structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organizational patterns connectors and cohesive devices

C2 Proficiency

This course aims at level C2 of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

Students at this level can:

- understand with ease virtually everything heard or read
- summarize information from different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation
- express themselves spontaneously very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations

Library: The library of the Hellenic American Union develops, protects, and disseminates the Union's knowledge resources, and provides training, tools, technologies and support to facilitate student learning, faculty research, and the achievement of the Hellenic American Union's overall mission.

REGISTRATION POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A. Tuition fees: Payment - Discounts

- Tuition and registration fees must be paid in full at the time of registration.
- Students registering at the Hellenic American Union premises may pay in cash or by credit card. Students may also deposit the tuition fees directly into the HAU's bank account.
- Spouses, siblings, and parents/legal guardians and children of those currently enrolled are entitled to a 5% discount for the total duration of their studies in any of the following Programs: English Language Program and Modern Greek Language Program.

B. Tuition fees: Refunds

- Courses that do not have a sufficient number of students enrolled may be cancelled, and the students concerned may be requested to transfer to a course in another available time slot with those tuition fees already paid used to offset those of the new course.
- In the event that a course is cancelled and students do not wish to transfer to another one, tuition fees will be refunded within one month.
- Students who inform Registration and Student Services before the third session that they will be unable to continue are eligible to receive a refund of 50% of the total tuition fee, but only if they have paid the total amount of tuition fees and present their receipt.
- Students who exceed the permitted number of absences are removed from the class roster and are not entitled to the refund of the tuition fees they have paid.
- Repeated misconduct can lead to a student's removal from the class. Those students removed from a class are not entitled to the refund of the tuition fee they have paid.
- Classes that have been cancelled due to circumstances beyond the Hellenic American Union's control are not made up and the tuition fees are not refunded.
- No course or schedule changes are allowed after a student has registered.

C. Priorityregistration and pre-registration of students in English and Modern Greek language programs.

Continuing students who have successfully completed a course are entitled to priority registration for the next course with the same time schedule. Pre-registration is on the last day of classes, care of their instructor and Registration and Student Services. In all other cases, continuing students are subject to the same regulations as new students.

D. Registration of Students

- Students register at Registration and Student Services located at Massalias 22.
- Students register on a first-come-first-served basis and may choose their preferred course schedule depending on availability of places.
- New students must complete and sign the Student's Registration Card (available in English and Greek).

F. Late Admission

A student can enroll in a course that is already in progress under the following conditions:

- If the time elapsed from the beginning of the course until the time of the student's enrollment does not exceed 1/5 of the total course duration.
- If the student fulfills all the course entrance requirements.
- If the above conditions are met, the student can apply for late admission after speaking with the Program's Academic Assistants who will consult with the class instructor.
- The student will be informed about any/all work that they will need to complete in order to enter the course in progress.
- Registration and Student Services will then be notified that late admission has been approved.

F. Unregistered Individuals

- No one is permitted to attend a Hellenic American Union course unless their name appears on the class roster and has paid the fultion fees
- If such persons are present in a class, instructors will refer them to Registration and Student Services

G. Miscellaneous Information

- Once you have successfully completed a course, you may ask for a Certificate of Attendance from Registration and Student Services (Massalias 22).
- For educational reasons, we recommend that you attend a course from its start, especially if it is a Beginners course. However, if you wish to register for a course after the start date, you can do so by following proper

registration procedures.

- If you think that you are not placed at the appropriate level, you should speak to your instructor before the third lesson.
- The maximum number of adult students in speaking skills classes and exam preparation classes is 14. In all other classes it is 18, with the exception of the Modern Greek Language Program classes which is 14.
- The maximum number of young learners and adolescents students is 12. The maximum number of students in the special Kindergarten classes is 14.
- You are expected to pay the tuition fees in full no matter how many lesson-hours you attend.

PLACEMENT TESTS

In order to serve students more efficiently, placement tests in English and Modern Greek are offered primarily online. Test scores are valid for one calendar year. Students who do not enroll in a program within a year after taking a placement test are required to retake the test.

On-site test

- The placement tests are administered at the Hellenic American Union premises on weekdays throughout the calendar year during working hours.
- Placement tests are scored within one working day after their administration, and test scores are made available to prospective students.
- The placement test consists of multiple-choice items and its duration ranges from 60 to 90 minutes. For the Young Learners and Adolescents program, a writing sample is also included in the Placement test.

Online test

- Tests are available through the Hellenic American Union website.
- In order to take the placement test, an e-mail address is required. The test is scored automatically
 and test scores are made available to the prospective students via e-mail.
- The placement test consists of multiple-choice items. The maximum time allotted to complete
 the test ranges from 60 to 90 minutes.
